

OBJECTIVES

The 10th AJIVE International Symposium is guided by the following objectives:

1. To provide a dedicated platform for veterinary researchers, academicians, clinicians, and postgraduate students from Indonesia and Japan to present and disseminate original scientific findings across the full spectrum of veterinary and animal health sciences.
2. To strengthen and institutionalize collaborative ties between veterinary faculties, research institutions, and professional bodies in Japan and Indonesia, in pursuit of shared goals in education, research, and clinical practice.
3. To advance interdisciplinary dialogue on the One Health paradigm, with particular emphasis on the interfaces between animal health, human health, and environmental sustainability in the context of Southeast Asian and Indo-Pacific ecosystems.
4. To address emerging and re-emerging infectious diseases, antimicrobial resistance, parasitic infestations, and other priority challenges in animal health that carry implications for food security, biodiversity conservation, and public health.
5. To facilitate the exchange of methodological innovations in veterinary diagnostics, molecular biology, clinical pathology, and surgical practice, thereby contributing to the continuous improvement of veterinary education and professional standards in both countries.
6. To support the professional development of early-career researchers and postgraduate students by providing opportunities for scientific presentation, peer engagement, and mentorship within an international academic forum.
7. To produce a body of peer-reviewed scientific output — including published abstracts and full papers — that contributes to the global repository of knowledge in veterinary and animal health sciences.
8. To reaffirm and celebrate a decade of productive academic partnership within the AJIVE network, and to chart a forward-looking agenda for continued collaboration in the years ahead.

These objectives collectively reflect the symposium's commitment to scientific excellence, international collaboration, and the sustained advancement of veterinary medicine as a discipline of both academic rigour and societal relevance.
